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# Ecumenism - Dead or Prophetic? By Rev Fiona Bennett

As far as I understand, back in 1972 when the URC was born there were both visionary and pragmatic forces at work.

The pragmatic forces were that in England and Wales the theology and nature of the Congregational & Presbyterian Churches could be seen to be very close and at the same time the numbers and organisational life of the denominations were time limited. The visionary force was an understanding that Christ calls the Church to be One, and that the holding of our diverse body together is in itself a light or hope/a revelation of the Realm of God to the whole world.

The Vision of 1972 was that in 40 years (a good Biblical number!) all the Reformed Churches in the UK would be part of one organisation, which held diversity within it. In 1986 the Churches of Christ joined in with this vision

and in 2000 the Scottish Congregational Church.

2012 (40 years) came and went. Now in 2019 it can seem that in this age with institutional decline (for the Church and other institutions) many denominations are not moving toward greater organic unity, but retreating into our corners to map out our own plans for survival. So is the whole notion of Ecumenism dead?

The Living the Questions Discussion group in March listened to Bishop Yvette Flunder of the UCC speaking about a new Pentecost which she believes is on its way. Like the first Pentecost, which drew together people from every race and background and birthed them into one Church, Bishop Flunder is convinced that a time is coming when Churches will be forced to set aside what divides us, to seek and work for the common

Bishop Flunder spoke about visiting people in the wake of Hurricane Katrina, and commented that disaster often focuses the mind to set aside what used to matter in order to focus on what really matters. She said: "When you house is under water, it really does not matter if your handbag matches you shoes, what matters is your children are missing."

What are the common denominators revealed just this past month in Mozambique, Malawi, Zimbabwe, Christ Church New Zealand?

Is there a new Pentecost coming which drives a different type of ecumenism? An ecumenism which is driven not by denominational competitiveness but by the survival of human life on our planet? Is the new Pentecost a movement of the Spirit to burn away the deeply held identities and beliefs which divide us from other Christians and peoples of other faiths, and refine us down to focus on what really matters?

If as people of faith we can lose our grip on the fight for our denominational survivals, then perhaps we can begin to live Christ's vision of God's Children (of all faiths) held together in one diverse and messy (but healthy) body, and live out an ecumenism which truly will be to the whole world a prophetic (and pragmatic) vision of hope.

To mark International Women's Day last month, the University of Edinburgh chose to rename the boardroom of Argyle House after a much loved and active elder in AUC, Brenda Moon.



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Brenda was the first woman to head up a research university library when she was librarian at the University in the 1980s and

90s. She played a major role in bringing the University into the digital age, as Edinburgh became the first major university library in the UK to tackle and deliver a computer-based service.

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# The Local Church (TLC)



TLC refers to three churches in our neighbourhood who have similar, relatively progressive stands on theology and are inclusive of people of many different 'varieties'. The three are: **Augustine** (United Reformed Church), **Greyfriars Kirk** (Church of Scotland) and **St Columba's by the Castle** (Scottish Episcopal Church). We covenanted together in 1998 to try to do as much a possible together by way of Christian action in the community, even though we enjoy our own individual styles of worship.

At recent meetings of the TLC Steering Group (which meets three times a year and has two or three representatives from each of the churches as well as their Ministers) there was discussion about whether we are doing as much working together as we should; and it became apparent that people are really not aware of what the other churches are already doing. In an effort to keep everyone better informed, we thought that we might submit articles about some of the other church community outreach activities. These will be appearing from time-to-time in Seeds.

The Grassmarket Community Project (now a charity in its own right - and winner of the award for Social Enterprise of the Year!) started existence many years ago in what was Greyfriars' Kirkhouse. Feeding of homeless people was run on different evenings by Greyfriars Guild Members, other helpers (which included some of us from AUC and St Columba's), by theology students living at the Grassmarket Mission and by some veterinary students as well. Over time and through various incarnations, a new multi-purpose building was produced and funding sought for a variety of activities; it became a separate charity in 2010. The activity our church folk have been most involved with is the Monday Open Meal. Nowadays, cooking the two course meals is done by the GCP chefs and we serve the food, chat to clients and clear up afterwards. There are regular haircutting and hairdressing opportunities; vets come from time-to-time to care for the animals (mainly dogs) that some clients have as companions. At 7pm nearly every Monday of the year there is now a free film show too. (Open to all!)

What else happens at this project though? There is a full programme of daytime activities, designed to help those marginalised from society. Often folk have had experience of homelessness, though extremely few are actually homeless now. The activities over six, or occasionally seven, days a week range from woodwork classes to improving basic literacy, development of IT skills, drama groups, cooking training, and sewing and tailoring skills.

Some will have seen clothes and items made in Greyfriars own tartan. In the past at AUC we have seen, or even bought, samples of some of the beautifully crafted woodwork done by Tommy Steel's recruits. Some people have gone on to employment in woodworking, or in the hospitality and catering sectors. Currently Tommy is very successfully fundraising to take a team of clients to help build a school in a remote area of Zambia this summer!

There are walking groups, some go swimming together, gardening is still continued, music and photography can be taught...and so on.

Anyone can go for help - or can volunteer, as volunteers are always needed to assist. Sometimes those seeking help in one way can be the volunteer helper in another scenario. # Getting to Grips with the Kitchen



n our AUC Pantry, we have green bins on the counter-top for composting used tea bags, ground coffee residue, fruit cores and peel, uncooked vegetable peelings and dead flowers.

No cooked food should go into these bins, please. This means things like bread, biscuits, cakes, pieces of cheese and leftover sandwiches should mot go in. There are now biodegradable, disposable lining bags in the bins, to allow the contents to be tied up daily pending removal for recycling. Thank you for co-operating with this.

Last September our Synod Church & Society Committee asked all local churches to ensure (as far as is possible) that we do not use **single-use plastic** drinking straws, cups, spoons, etc. This is something we were already doing. However, there were some single use plastic straws and cups in our cupboards – these have been removed and have been replaced by vegetable-ware biodegradable cups and straws and wooden spoons – all of which should be used only if we do not have china crockery and cutlery available. Afterwards these should be washed (in the dishwasher please, if possible).

I have been recently been researching a **replacement product for Cling Film!** At home and often in the church, we can cover leftover food in sealed containers, on plates covered with upturned plates or with the tops of containers which have lids. Many people are re-using ice-cream and take-away containers and margarine tubs for leftovers and we can use food containers (plastic perhaps, but not single-use) like Tupperware. However, for large trays of sandwiches it can be convenient to use cling-film (in AUC we often use clean tea towels for this) but is there another option? Please let us know if there is! (There are bees-waxed paper solutions – which are expensive to buy but which can be washed and reused. Has anyone ever done this?)

What other ways have you found to avoid using plastic, particularly single-use plastic?
