
Using your two word clues see if you can understand what this part of Peter's letter is saying. A third clue is the last four lines of this section of the letter is a quote taken from the Old Testament from the book of Isaiah. Peter remembered from his knowledge of the Old Testament, a piece of scripture that refers to stones. A fourth clue is that Zion is a hill in Jerusalem.

1 Peter 2: v 4-6 (GNB)

Come to the Lord, the living stone, rejected by people as worthless but chosen by God as valuable. Come as living stones, and let yourselves be used in building the spiritual temple, where you will serve as holy priests to offer spiritual and acceptable sacrifices to God through Jesus Christ. For the scripture says.

"I chose a valuable stone, which I am placing as the cornerstone in Zion, and whoever believes in him will never be disappointed."

- I wonder who the cornerstone is?
- I wonder what the spiritual temple is?
- I wonder who the living stones are?



Peter was explaining that to build something you need the exact stone to build everything else around. The wrong cornerstone will not do. Peter was thinking that just like you need the right cornerstone for a building you need the right person to build a church around. Jesus was the cornerstone of the church but one person does not make a church. You need all sorts of different people who believe in the church's cornerstone to make a strong living church. Can you recognise Peter's letter in this poem?
