Story Psalms

Everybody loves a story. Since earliest times, people have gathered together to share stories and often these stories concerned what had happened to themselves, their families or their groups.

These stories become the 'history' of a family, a people or a nation. The stories may include times of great joy and celebration, times of anxiety and hardship, times when amusing things happened and times when people were afraid.



- ❖What do you know about your own story?
- ❖ Have you heard any stories about when you were a baby?
- ❖ Can you remember anything about the day you started nursey or school?
- ❖ Has anyone in your family told you stories about when your parents or grandparents were children?
- ❖ Maybe you have a family tree recording names and birthdays of family members or you have some other clever way of remembering those with' great 'before their name.

I wonder if sharing stories of happy, sad or exciting times helps you to feel part of your family? Are other stories important to you? What about Bible stories? You could look for one now that is special for you.

Some Psalms particularly help the Jewish people to remember their past history and relationship with God. They recount what has happened and how God helped them.

I wonder why the writer thinks it is important to go back so far into the past and remember what happened? Read the section of Psalm 136 below remembering that the word Israel is another way of describing the Jewish people and that He refers to God

See if you can work out what story in the Old Testament the psalmist is reminding people of.

Psalm 136 verses 11- 14:

He rescued Israel from Egypt,

God's love never fails.

God used his great strength

and his powerful arm.

God's love never fails.

He split the Red Sea apart.

God's love never fails.

The Lord brought Israel safely

through the sea.

God's love never fails. CEV

Have you noticed that after each verse sentence there is a repeated sentence? God's love never fails It is like a little chorus that appears at the end of each verse of the psalm and there are 26 of them in total.



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I wonder why the writer does this? Maybe it is important to remember that in good and also fearful times God is with us and that praise and thankfulness can always be there in words and music.





After all, in the language of Hebrew, which the psalms were originally written in, the Hebrew word for psalms is Tehillim and means 'praises ' It looks like this תהלים

Then when the Old Testament containing the Book of Psalms, was translated into Greek, the Greek word used for psalms was psalmoi which means 'songs accompanied by music ' It looks like this $\psi\alpha\lambda\mu$ oí.
